

MAKE A PRINT COPY OF THE CONTENTS OF A FOLDER OR CD

Using Windows Explorer, printing a list of files contained within a CD or folder is hard work. In fact, it's almost impossible. There are a couple fast and efficient utility freeware programs that let you print a list of files located in any folder – and in any number of subfolders.

These freeware programs let you print a folder's contents. Test one or both of these:

PrintFolder: <http://no-nonsense-software.com/download.html>

PrintFolder is a useful utility for creating a list of files and folders, a feature missing in Windows Explorer. Right-click on any folder in Windows Explorer and choose "PrintFolder".

MaxLister is a free application which allows you to create virtual images of hard drives, floppy disks, CDs, flash drives or other removable media. For example, this is useful if you want to keep track of that vast CD collection. With MaxLister, you can save any drive or folder to a .MXL-file - a database file - and later browse and search it in Windows Explorer. You can import new folders/filenames from another MXL-file if you want to keep different drives in a common file. You can also batch search through a multiple number of MXL-files so that you don't have to load every single file and then repeatedly search through them; looking for that particular filename. The MXL file also contains file sizes, and a comment so that you can personalize your information about the drive. If you don't want to create a viewable database, you can choose to store your drive information in a plain text file - easy to view and share with people who don't already have MaxLister. The plain text formats are separated in 3 different layouts: *Collapsed*, *Folders only* and *Folders and Filenames*.

CDVista catalogs your CDs and removable drives. It scans photo CDs and stores thumbnail images on your PC. After your CD is scanned, you create a name for the CD. This allows you to search for files without having to blindly insert many CDs. CDVista can extract meta data contained in audio, Internet and text files.
